A REAL 1/48 scale L-4 kit!

We've had several Piper L-4/J-3 items in *beaveR-Tales* recently, and they always bemoaned the fact that there was no real 1/48 scale kit. Last issue we teased you with some news about Special Hobby's new L-4 kit almost being ready. Well... here it is! And it's nice. The very sturdy box contains two plastic sprues, another sprue with the clearest clear



parts you've ever seen, decal sheets, a tiny 3D-printed carburator intake, a small piece of clear film for the instrument faces, and a small piece of photo-etch for various cockpit parts. The instructions are a 16-page booklet. We got ours direct from the producer in the Czech Republic, but they should be arriving at your favourite hobby outlet soon.

IAN SIBBALD (Uncle Freddie)

June 6, 1937 ~ August 29, 2022

It is with great sorrow that we announce that lan Sibbald passed away at his home in Courtenay, BC on August 29, 2022.

lan was a man of firm opinions and an abiding sense of humour, who loved to entertain and tell stories. Ian was deeply committed to his family and his career in the Royal Canadian Air Force.

lan joined the air cadets while still in high school. In 1956 he joined the Royal Canadian Air Force and began pilot training in Claresholm, Alberta. After Wings graduation, he began a 36-year career in the RCAF, logging 8,963 hours of flight





time with postings at Penhold AB, Ottawa, Colorado Springs, NDHQ, Edmonton, Trenton, Lahr Germany, Damascus Syria, Tiberius and Jerusalem in Israel, Ottawa again, and Comox, BC where he retired with the rank of Squadron Leader in 1991.

lan was an ardent student of military history with a collection of over 3,000 books, a passion for war gaming and a consummate skill in constructing plastic models. Some of his models are on display at the Canadian War Museum in Ottawa. He was a founding father of IPMS Canada (membership #32), and for nearly 20 years, he wrote a regular column for RT that was both informative and amusing, under the pseudonym of "Uncle Freddie". Those of you with old back issues or the USB archive can read and enjoy them all.










I was solely influenced to build this vintage 1/48 scale Lindberg kit when I saw the Jenny to Canuck conversion article and decal sheet in an issue of **RT** from a few years back. (Ed note: This conversion info also appeared







The kit had a very rudimentary engine, so I used the sample at the Canada Aviation and Space Museum as a reference for some detailing. The flying surfaces featured my first attempt at pre-shading the rib structure to imitate light shining through the canvas. Rigging was from EZ Line. Pulleys were created with a punch and die set.



I used a resin interior from Lone Star models, which required a lot of surgery to fit. At the end of the day, not much of it can been seen in such a small cockpit.

The figure is the WWI British RFC Mechanic from Model Cellar.



The IPMS/USA 2022 National Convention (the 'Nats') was held at the La Vista Conference Center in Omaha, Nebraska. The hosting group, Fort Crook IPMS/USA, has held the Nats here twice before so it is a well-known venue for attendees. They were hard-working and well organized, and delivered another well-run event for all to enjoy.

The Convention hosts like to say this is a "right sized" convention and they are quite correct. Two vendor rooms, a large model room attached to the two hotels. (Luckily, since it was really hot and bright outside.) Eduard was the star of the vendor room, selling almost 500 of their just-released 1/48

F4F-3 Wildcats, along with tons of other Eduard models and accessories.

Estimates say there were over 3,000 models on the table (including displayonly models) and the quality each year just keeps getting better and better. While aircraft is still the current king of the IPMS Nats competition, there was also so much armour on the tables it

was almost overwhelming. A few odd notes: not one, but two of the new Revell 1/48 SR-71s were on the table, and in 1/72 twin-engined jets, there was not a single F-4 Phantom, but three Blackburn Buccaneers.

With a bar on the way to the main hotel, there was also no shortage of socializing at the convention. The 2023 convention in Texas is less than a year away, so get building!

The IPMS Canada 'Best Canadian Subject' Award

Unfortunately we couldn't find enough volunteers to help out with the IPMS Canada 'Best Canadian Subject' award. The national executive therefore decided not to proceed with the award this year, although we are very grateful to those who stepped forward to help, and even those who had to cancel because real life got in the way. This all prompted some serious discussion as to how we should proceed in the future; you'll











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ROYAL CANADIAN NAVY Aircraft Finish and Markings 1944 – 1968



"Royal Canadian Navy, Aircraft Finish and Markings, 1944-1968, Volume 2" The "Grey Book" (2021)

This book illustrates RCN aircraft finish and markings used between 1944 and 1968, expanding further on the material covered in the first volume published in 2007. This is designed as the companion for the first book and also as a stand-alone book on the subject. This volume tells the story in text, photos and drawings of the Canadian Naval Air Arm, from the beginning with the manning of HMS Nabob and HMS Puncher, the two escort carriers starting in late 1943 in Vancouver, until the demise of the Royal Canadian Navy in 1968. The work runs 152 pages (14 in colour + 4 covers), 130+ drawings, over 360 photos, plus a further 60+ colour. Ask about an all special colour printing.

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
